



## The Federal Census

Since 1790, the United States government has taken a nationwide population count every ten years to determine each state's representation in the House of Representatives.

From the first census (1790) to the most recent census available to the public (1920), the federal census records present a readily accessible resource that is rich in personal information about the people of the United States. The importance of census records does not lessen over time, and few public records reveal so many details about individuals, families, and communities as do the population schedules of the United States census.

The federal census is one of the most useful tools for genealogists. Each of the ten year enumerations of the residents of the United States has its own potential for solving mysteries of the past. While some inaccuracies are to be expected in census records, they still provide some of the most fascinating and useful items of personal history to be found anywhere.

Like nearly all sources, census records contain errors and omissions, and require thorough validation of evidence from other sources to evaluate findings before drawing conclusions. Census enumerators were not necessarily well educated or particularly qualified for the job, and anyone who has studied census records knows that good handwriting was not a requirement. Census takers were political appointees who were frequently chosen because they were of the correct political affiliation in a particular time and place, or just because they knew the right people.

Despite its imperfections, the federal census is one of the most widely used resources in almost every genealogical research project for placing individuals in a particular time and place, and for connecting people with other sources of information.

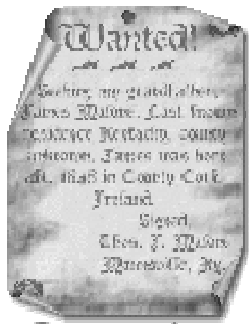

### John Peel

Feb. 24, 1803; May 22, 1803

Currituck Co. Will Book 2, p. 225

In the name of God Amen, February the 24th one thousand eight hundred and three, I **JOHN PEEL** of Kennekeet in the County of Currituck and State of North Carolina, being very sick and weak of body but of perfect mind and memory . Thanks be given unto God, calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain this my Last Will and Testament, that is to say, principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God, that gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be burried in decent christian burrial at the discretion of my executors nothing doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath been please God to bless me in this life I give dimise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form

First I give and bequeath unto **JULIA** my beloved Wife the place where I now live, fifty acres of land with all my plantation improvements, during her natural life or widowhood and after her decease to belong to my Son **ANDREW PEEL** likewise I leave her my boat to the use of her and the children,

likewise I leave her my mare *cubenero* and ????? net for the same purpose, likewise leave her my sheep except three head and all my household furniture, during her life or widowhood, after that to belong to my Son **ANDREW PEEL**

also I give unto my youngest Daughter **KITTEY** thirty six acres of land to the north of the fifty acres belonging to my Wife joining of it

also I give unto my Daughter **ELIZABETH** fifty acres of land lying at the south end of the myrtle thicket likewise one feather bed.

also I give unto my Daughter **ANGELICA** one feather bed and one cow

also I give unto my Daughter **CHRISTIAN** one feather bed

also I give unto my Daughter **HULDAH** one feather bed

also I give unto **JOHN BARNES** five head of sheep

also I give unto my daughter **KITTY** one feather bed

also I give all my hogs unto my Wife

also I leave a small boat frame and one gun to be sold

I appoint my Wife and **CHRISTOPHER FLOWERS** to be executors to this my Last Will and Testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year above written

*JOHN PEEL seal*

Signed sealed and delivered in presence of us

**JOSEPH GRAY** jurat

**CHRISTOPHER PEEL**

Recorded and examined the 22 day of May 1803

## INFORMATION ABOUT ZILLAH CROSS PEEL

Zillah Cross Peel (1874-1941) was an Arkansas newspaper editor and writer. Born to Harvey and Ella Cross of Cameron, Missouri, Zillah attended the public schools there until being admitted to the University of Arkansas in 1891. Also during that year her father established the Benton County Sun, a newspaper in Bentonville, Arkansas. Zillah married Frank W. Peel, a son of United States Representative S.W. Peel of Bentonville, in 1894 and the couple had five children, Maurine, Frank, Jr., Samuel, Mary, and Zillah.

## PEEL FAMILY CEMETERY

Named for the pioneering Peel family who settled in the area in the 1860's from Mississippi.

This cemetery is located 1/2 mile south of the Kaufman-Henderson County line, south of the Old Peeltown Community. It is accessible only on foot as there is a very large & deep creek bed that must be crossed to reach it. It is about 3/4 acre in size, completely fenced & is on the south bank of the creek. It is overgrown in brush, weeds & cactus. In very poor shape, yet location is probably responsible for it's preservation.

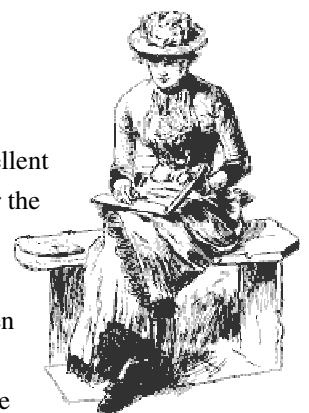

A rich woman's dressing table might hold wart remover, rouge, paint for whitening the face, and excellent cosmetic water to carry off freckles, sun-burn or pimples...a curious red-pomatum to plump and color the lips, a depilatory (such as vinegar, walnut oil, quicklime or cat's dung), sticks or powder for cleaning the teeth, a never-failing remedy for offensive breaths, a famous essence to correct the ill scents of the arm-pits, a rich water that makes the hair curl, a most delicate paste to smooth and whiten the hands, perfume and a curling iron. There might also be a small box of black velvet or silk patches to stick to the face. The patches, cut in circles or other shapes, and worn in such numbers that the face sometimes appeared "*full of flies*", were ridiculed by Addison in the *Spectator*. "*The Women look like Angels, and would be more beautiful than the Sun, were it not for little black spots that are apt to break out in their faces, and sometimes rise in very odd figures.....I have seen a spot upon the forehead in the afternoon, which was upon the chin in the morning*".



Another little box might hold false eyebrows made of mouse skin that could, in a hot room, begin to slide down an unfortunate woman's face.

### *The Ongoing Life's Collection of Poetry by C. Taylor White*

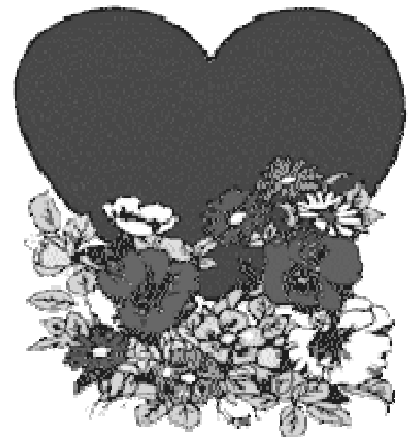

**Initials after your ancestor's names may provide useful information that you'd not expected. The following list includes initials you may come across when reading old wills or other documents**

**a.a.s.** - died in the year of his/her age (anno aetatis suae) (86 y/o or died in year 86 of his/her life)

**d.s.p.** - died without issue (decessit sine prole legitima)

**d.s.p.l.** - died without legitimate issue (decessit sine prole mascula supesita)

**d.s.p.m.s.** - died without surviving male issue (decessit sine prole mascula supersita)

**d.s.p.s.** - died without surviving issue (decessit sine prole supersita)

**d.unm** - died unmarried

**d.v.p.** - died in the lifetime of his father (decessit vita patris)

**d.v.m.** - died in the lifetime of his mother (decessit vita matris)

**Et al** - and others (et alia)

**Inst** - present month (instans)

**Liber** - book or volume

**Nepos** - grandson

**Nunc** - Nuncupative will, an oral will, written by a witness

**Ob** - he/she died (obit)

**Relict** - widow or widower (relicta/relictus)

# WILLS

(Received from the files of Pete Austin/Horace Peele)

**Josiah Peele Sr** (Joshua<sup>5</sup>, 4.Robert<sup>4</sup>, 3.Robert<sup>3</sup>, 2.Robert<sup>2</sup>, 1.Lawrence<sup>1</sup>) b. 1752, Bertie Co. NC, m. **Milley Higgs\***, b. 1752, Bertie Co NC, d. bef 1841, Bertie Co NC. Josiah died 1843, Bertie Co. NC, buried: Unknown. Josiah Peele Lived on the Moore Road that went from Lewiston towards Kelford. This gravel road went from the intersection of the Lewiston-Aulander Highway to the Harrell siding road that came from Kelford. He lived to be 92 years of age.

**Josiah Peele** wrote his Will which was dated the 6th day of November 1841.

Text of this Will follows:

*In the name of God, Amen. I **Josiah Peele Senior** of Bertie Co, State of NC, being in sound mind, memory and understanding make and ordain this my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following.*

*Viz. **Item the 1st.** I give and bequest to my son **Josiah Peele Jr** all my lands lying between Walton (Wattom Swamp) Pocosin and Cashie Branch it being the land which my dwelling house stands on, also one black walnut table and one hand mill, to him and his heirs and assigns forever. Also one bed and furniture.*

***Item the 2nd.** I give and bequest to my son **James Peele** the land whereon he now lives, also the Masons track containing one hundred acres more or less to him, his heirs and assigns forever.*

***Item third,** I give and bequest all my property not herein given away to be equally divided between (1).**Dempsey Peele Heirs (Dempsey died 1838 )**, (2). **William Peele Heirs (William died 1829)**, (3).**Mary Cox (married Ezekiel Cox )**. (4) **Elizabeth Cox (married John Cox)**, (5) **Lynda Cox (married George W Cox** all of which were Cox brothers), (6).**Josiah Peele** and (7).**James Peele** to them, their heirs and assigned for ever.*

*Lastly, I appoint constitute and appoint **Josiah Peele Junr** and **William Cox** Executors to this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all former Wills by me herefore made in witness whereof. I have set my hand and affixed my seal the 6th day of November 1841.*

"X" mark with **Josiah Peele Senr.**

Witnessed by **Richard Cox** and **George W Cox**.

From the entries in Josiah's Will they would have lived in the middle of the Cox clan.

Three daughters married a Cox and two Cox son-in laws witnessed Josiah's will.

**William Peele** (Josiah<sup>6</sup>, 13.Joshua<sup>5</sup>, 4.Robert<sup>4</sup>, 3.Robert<sup>3</sup>, 2.Robert<sup>2</sup>, 1.Lawrence<sup>1</sup>) b. c1780, Rhodes Place Crossroad, Bertie Co.NC, m. (1) 08-11-1800, **Lucy Rhodes**, b. c 1780 ?, m. (2) c1805, **Sarah Young** , b. 1792, NC, (daughter of **John Young** and Martha Averitt) d. aft 1850 census. William died 11-1829, Snakebite Township Bertie Co. NC.

In William Peele's Will that was recorded in Bertie Co NC Nov.1829 and dated Oct.28 1829 is as follows:

*In the name of God, Amen: I **William Peele**, being of sound and disposing mind but weak in body, do make and publish this my last will and test.*

***First**, I give to my loving wife **Sally (Young) Peele** the following articles. (viz) one horse, her choice of, three cows and calves, ten ewes and lambs, three sows and pigs, her choice in cows, sows and ewes. Fifty barrels of corn. two beds & furniture, one loom, one chest, one table, one wool wheel, one lining wheel, three cedar barrels, my kitchen furniture, one yoaok of oxen & cart, ten blade stacks of fodder and as much meat as will be sufficient to serve she and her family for one year. I do also lind her one-half of the land and plantation whereon I now live and three Negro slaves, namely **Richard, Charlotte and Willis**, during her natural life, and at her death to be equally divided between all my children. I give also one sidesaddle and bridle to my loving wife **SALLY PEELE**.*

***Secondly**, I give to my son **JARROD PEELE**, one mule named Jack, and bridle and saddle.*

***Thirdly**, I give to my son **WILLIAM PEELE** one horse, bridle and saddle.*

***Fourthly**, I wish all the rest of my property, not disposed of after paying my debts to remain in the hands of my Executors until my son **Jarrood** arrives at the age of twenty one years, and then to be equally between all my children, and their heirs forever.*

***And lastly**, I nominate and appoint my friend **Humphrey H Hardy** and **Jesse Averitt**, my Executors to this Last Will and Testament, revoking all others heretofore made & published this to be my only will and testament given under my hand and seal this 28th day of October AD 1829.*

"X" **William Peele**.

**Baliss H Bond** Witnessed: (Baliss married William's wife's sister)

Assigned and published in the presence of **Josiah Wilson**

Note:

In William's will he names sons **JARROD & WILLIAM**, and his spouse (wife Sarah) **Sally (Young) Peele** (his second wife). William wrote his will Oct 28,1829 and recorded it Nov 1829, and his son Jarrod was not of legal age when he wrote his will. In data from **Horace Peele** he names two additional daughters: Nancy Caroline Peele b.c1808 and Marina E Peele b.c1812 that married (Mr) Casper. No other information available. Additional information came from **Wayne Modlin** listed a son named **Andrew Peele** that married 1st, **Rowena Baker** (no known issue), 2nd **Louisa Pritchard** and had a son **Drew (Andrew Jr) Peele** that married **Mary Morris**. The children were **Oakley, William "Willie", Allie** and **Cohen Bailey Peele**.

Information obtained from William's will was that he gave slaves, personal items and one-half lifetime rights in house he now lived in, land and plantation [plantation was house and land with over 100 acres] to his wife. He gave personal items to his two-named son's, **Jarrood** and **William** (no other data except he died c Aug 1859). He stated in this will that the remaining estate was to be divided between *all my children and their heirs forever* after all his



debts were paid. He did not name any children except **Jarrold** and **William** probably because all of the other children were under age at the time of his death.

Lucy: **Lucy** was the first wife of William Peele. She probably died young in life because William married 2nd Sarah Young and had seven additional children between 1808 and 1825.

**Lucy Rhodes** was probably a member of that family for which Rhodes' Place Crossroad received that name. The Peele family was also from this same area in Bertie. Hopefully more info can be found on Lucy Rhodes and her family.

Sarah: **Sarah Young** was known daughter of **John Young** and wife **Martha Averitt** (Young). Sarah was named in her mother's will probated in Bertie Co. in 1845 and recorded in *Book G page 439*. She appears as **Sarah Peel** in 1850 census at age 58. Living in household #958 with four of her children: **Drew Peel** 28 M Farmer born in NC, **James W, Peele** 26 M Farmer, NC, **Amilia G.** 24 F, NC, **Celia E.** 21 F, NC.

## The 1880 Federal Census

The 1880 census is the first census to specify a person's relationship to the head of household, marital status, illness or disability at the time the census was taken, number of months unemployed during the year, and the state or country of birth of every individual's father and mother.

The 1880 census may be helpful to verify birth and marriage records, or even to partially replace them when birth and marriage records are not recorded elsewhere. The census may be useful in helping researchers to identify previously unknown surnames of married daughters, mothers-in-law, cousins, and other relatives living within a family.

### Research Tips

The 1880 census makes it possible to identify the state or country of birth for parents-especially important for tracing movements of immigrant ancestors. The census may be used to supplement birth or marriage records for the census year or even to partially replace them where vital records are not recorded elsewhere. The census may also be useful in discovering previously unknown surnames of married daughters, mothers-in-law, cousins, and other relatives living with the family. This is the first census to state relationship to the head of household, but the wife may not be the mother of the children. The 1880 census may also provide clues to genetic symptoms and diseases in earlier generations of a family.

### Questions asked in the 1880 Census

For each person in every household, the census asked **name**; whether **white, black, mulatto, Indian, or Chinese**; **sex**; **age**; **month of birth** if born within the year; **relationship** to the head of the household; whether **single, married, widowed, or divorced**; whether **married within the year**; **occupation** and **months unemployed**; **name of state, territory, or country of birth**; **parents' birthplaces**; **school attendance within the year**; whether **unable to read if age ten or older**; and whether **sick or temporarily disabled on the day of enumeration and the reason therefore**. Those who were **blind, deaf-mute, "idiotic," insane, or permanently disabled** were also indicated as such.
