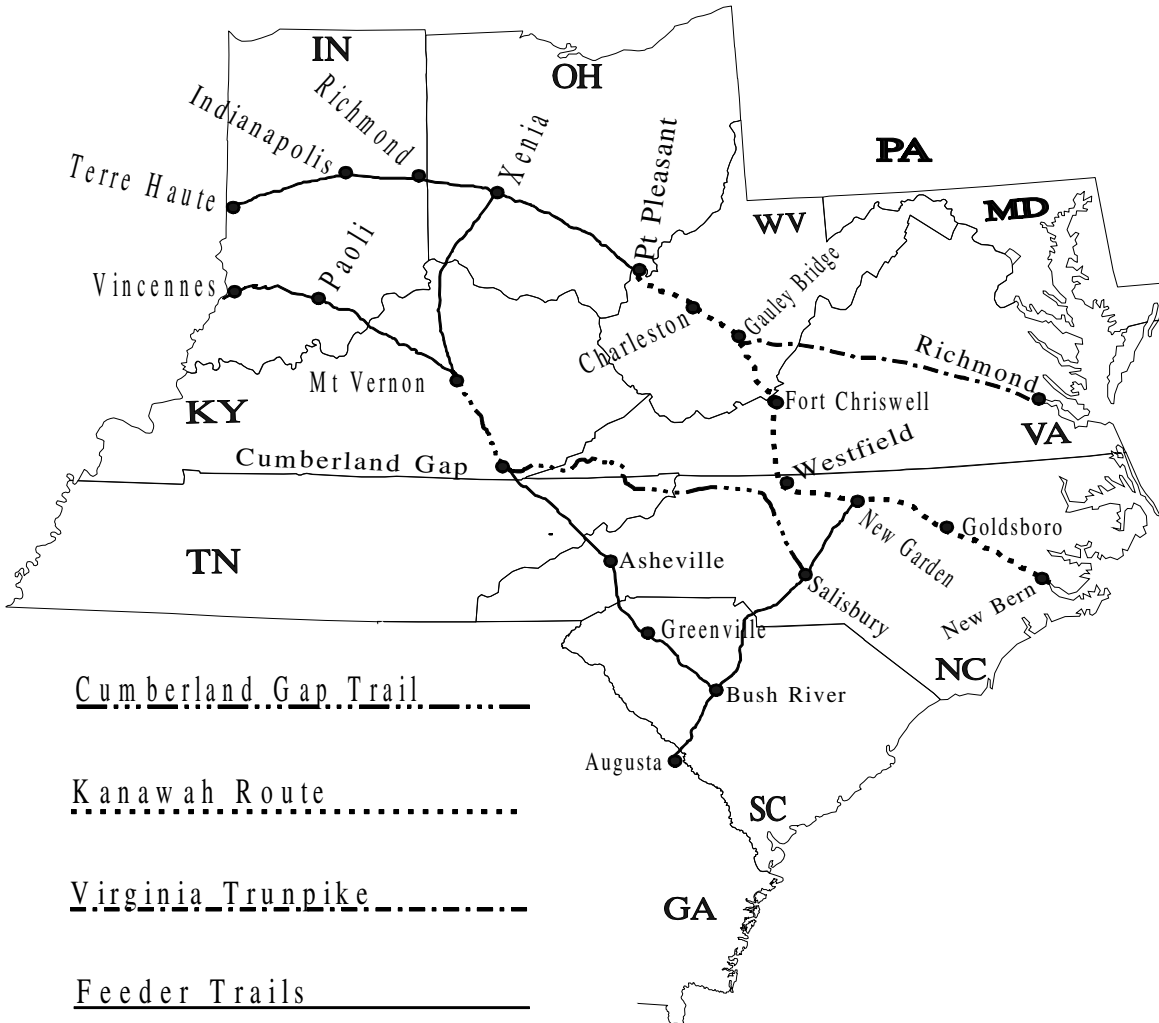

Feature Article

Major Routes Westward. While there were other trails, the following map depicts the major trails used by the Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina Quakers as they traveled westward. These were essentially the only roads West, with everyone traveling the same routes. The map also depicts locations of the then-existing Quaker Meeting Houses, since they were used as major stopping points during travel.

One of these trails, the Cumberland Gap Road, was also called Boone's Trail. It went from Salisbury, NC, through the Cumberland Gap to Mount Vernon, Kentucky. From there it split into two trails, one going almost due north into Ohio while the other continued northwest into Indiana. Many Quakers who came up from South Carolina and Georgia used this trail.



The other major trail was the Kanawah Route, which left the Coastal area of North Carolina and led toward Point Pleasant on the Ohio River by crossing Virginia and West Virginia on a North-by-Northwest course. It went through Westfield, Fort Chiswell, Gauley Bridge, and Charleston on its way to Ohio. Other Eastern Quakers traveled the Virginia Turnpike until it joined the Kanawah Trail at Gauley Bridge, West Virginia.

Before these trails were established, the earliest travelers followed buffalo trails or Indian paths. These soon widened into what might be called roads as many people traveled in wagons pulled by oxen or horses. Most able-bodied persons walked since the wagons were often loaded to capacity. Although many families traveled together to help ease the burden of getting wagons over steep hills, it was still a very dangerous trip and many died before reaching the Great Northwest Territory.

The Civil War caused more migrations. Hundreds of families were in desperate circumstances, left destitute by the ravages of war. Their Confederate money was worthless. Worse, there was no food for the table and no seeds to plant. At this time, Addison Coffin repeatedly visited Meetings across North Carolina, arguing that the Friends in the South had fulfilled their mission; that they had protested against slavery and against war; and since there was no occasion for them to stay longer in a hopeless situation, they should go west. Addison gave glowing accounts of the rich lands beyond the Ohio River. Between 1866 and 1872, Coffin organized up to ten emigrant trains each year and claimed to have transported some 14,000 people westward. Nearly half of these were children. The number of Quakers that traveled with Coffin is not known.

Peelle Related Quaker Moves. Many of our ancestors moved west on the above trails. The following incomplete list was primarily extracted from North Carolina Quaker Records. There are many more. These are a few:

Sarah “Sallie” Peelle (1771) traveled the Kanawah Route in 1808 to Jefferson County, Ohio. On 18 June 1808, Sarah Peelle and her husband Dr. Isaac Parker (1769) and five children transferred from Rich Square to the Short Creek Monthly Meeting in Ohio. They were accompanied on the trip by Sarah’s father-in-law, Jacob Parker (1746) and mother-in-law, Rhoda Draper (1746) and brother-in-law George Parker (1788), everyone transferring from Rich Square, Northampton, NC.

Albert Peele (1836) traveled the Virginia Turnpike in 1867 to Wayne County, Indiana. On 20 Feb 1864, Albert Peele and his wife Margaret Edna Cox (1842) transferred to the Rich Square Monthly Meeting (MM) from New Garden MM. After staying only two years, Albert transferred to the Black Creek MM on 21 Apr 1866 and to Sumerton MM in May 1866. On 25 Sep 1867, Albert and his family requested transfer to New Garden, Wayne County, Indiana, where they stayed until 27 Apr 1881 when his wife died. Albert then transferred to Damascus MM, Ohio, to marry.

After her husband died in 1810, **Celia Peele (1766)** moved to Indiana in 1832 with her daughter Charity Outland and the Overman families.

Milicent (Milisent) Peele wife of Henry Outland moved to New Garden in 1856.

James Peele (1794) moved to Arkansas after 1820.

Passco Peele's family moved to Wayne County, IN, in 1815 after he died in Richmond County, NC in 1807.

John Hollowell (1766) and his wife Miriam Overman (1764) moved to Valeene, Orange County, IN in April 1807. He was the first white settler in Orange county; his brother Robert moved there a few years later.

Fletcher Peelle (1805) moved to Indiana on 14 Oct 1826 from Contentnea with his \$300 plus inheritance.

Anne Peelle (1778) and husband Thomas Parker (1783) moved from Richmond County, NC, to White Water MM in Randolph County, IN, on a 19 Mar 1814 certificate from Piney Grove MM in Richmond County. They were the first settlers in Randolph County.

John Overman (1776) and **Anne Cox (1777)** daughter of Josiah Cox and Judith Peelle moved to Bloomfield, IN, in 10 Mar 1832.

Elizabeth Horn (1785) daughter of Pheriba Peelle (1765) and her husband Nathan Arnold (1783) moved to IN on 10 Mar 1827 from Wayne County, NC.

Anne Peelle (1811) daughter of John Peelle (1783) moved to Still Water, Ohio, on 8 Jul 1815 when she was only four years old, presumably to be raised by other Peelle relatives already there.

Sally Peelle (1793) and Elias Coleman (1798) moved their family to IN in 1828 to Grant County.

Elizabeth Peelle (1796) and her husband William Parker (1791) moved to Blue River MM, IN, in 1821.

John Jossey Peelle (1777) and his wife Elizabeth Woodard (1778) moved to Troup County, GA, in 1832.

Christiana Peelle (1756) and her husband Joseph Hall (1750) moved to Ohio in 1804.

Jesse Peelle (1803) and Zilpha Parker (1803) went to IN on 9 Aug 1828.

Reuben Peelle (1760) and his wife Rhoda Pearson (1750) were married in the Contentnea MM on 15 November 1778 and have the record for the most moves in any Peelle family's history. From Wayne County, NC, Reuben moved his family to Pitt County, NC, in 1787, then back to Wayne County, NC, in 1792, to Yadkin County, NC, in 1800, to Grayson County, VA, in 1806, to Wilkes County, NC, in 1808, to Surry County, NC, in 1810, to Wayne County, IN, in 1818, followed by another move within Wayne County, IN, in 1818, to Randolph County, IN, in 1820 and finally to Clinton County, Ohio, in 1833. All of these moves are tracked through the Quaker records.

Abigail Hollowell (1761) and her husband John Spivey (1761) transferred to Miami MM in Ohio on 10 Mar 1810 from Contentnea in Wayne County, NC.

Charity Peelle (1776) and her husband Carolus Judkins (1776) moved from New Garden MM, NC, to Still Water MM, OH on 30 Mar 1811.

Edwin Peelle (1823) moved to New Hope MM in Green County, TN, where he married Mary Jane Ellis on 27 Dec 1848.

William Peelle (1827) and wife Elizabeth Jane Rogerson moved to IN in 1861, lived north of Richmond, IN, with William's brother **Henry Peelle (1816)** until 1862. Then they moved to Carmel, IN. Both moved from Rich Square.

Margaret B. Peelle (1774) and her husband William Outland (1759) moved to Belmont County, IN.

These are a few, there were many others. Do you have a story about one of these, their flight to move west, their troubles encountered, etc., that you would like to write up and share?

Disconnected Families

Mystery Time!! Here are my *Ancient Orphans* for the quarter. Do you have any clues as to the parents of the Henry Peel or Jonathan Flowers "John" Peele below or John F. Peel or any information on their families, please let me know please!!



Henry Peel, Elder (1829-1908), of North Carolina. (Parents Unknown). Can anyone shed light as to the ancestors of this man?

This highly esteemed brother was born in Martin County, N. C., January 11, 1829, and died May 23, 1908; convicted of sin in his twenty-second year and given a sweet home in Jesus, and united with the church at Smith wicks Creek in October, 1852. He was soon impressed with the duty of preaching and In June, 1860, the church seeing that he had a gift liberated him to exercise his gift within the bounds of the church, and by September of the same year his preaching had proven so satisfactory that the church gave him license to preach where he might feel impressed to travel. Elder Peel was ordained to administer all the ordinances of the church March 1864, by Elders C. B. Hassell and William B. Perry. He was a faithful pastor served the church very zealously, laying a worthy example for a gospel minister. He was always on time, never waiting for the congregation, saying that the appointed time had come to begin the worship. He often exhorted the brethren to do their duty. He traveled and preached considerably in North Carolina and some in Tennessee and his diary shows he baptized 113 persons, married 165 couples, and preached 350 funerals, traveling 3,240 miles for the one purpose of preaching Jesus, never charging anything for any of his ministerial labors, holding the service of Christ to be above price. Like Paul he labored with his own hands to support himself and those depending on him. (Primitive or Old School Primitive Baptist Preachers, by R. H. Pitman, 1906. Contributed by Bobby Boykin, Wilson County, NC.)



Jonathan Flowers "John" Peele (1804-1881), of North Carolina. (Parents Unknown) referred to as Jonathan and/or John by some researchers.

In the 1790 census of Currituck, Edenton District, the name "Peel" is used for the three Peal's on the Outer Banks, Hatteras District, namely Frances, John & Christopher. In the 1850 Census Hyde Co. Hatteras District John" Peel" is listed with his family. In the Peele Cemetery in Hatteras, John and his three wives had a wooden marker made out of cedar. These markers kept rotting off at the bottom. Some years ago 20+ - Nacie Peele whose home was in front of the Cemetery replaced all 4 of them with marble, and the name "Peele" is on all three. John Peele is the only one with dates. Nacie said that his mother Beatrice "Beatie" knew most of the dates

for his wives but they were never carved into the new stones. All of the Peeles that were born on the Outer Banks are descendant of John Peel 11/27/1804 – 4/4/1881. Who John's parents are is pure speculation. Anyone have a clue?

John Fletcher Peel (1856?-????), of Kentucky?

I recently received the following query for another connection into the family. Several emails were condensed into the following scenario. Is John Fletcher Peel possibly related to our James Peelle, born 1794, son of David Peelle (1754-1807) and Priscilla Fletcher (1771-1807), who supposedly went west and died in Arkansas in 1848? James had a brother Fletcher Peelle who died in Indiana by this person is not from his family. Could they possibly be related? Does anyone have any information on this line?

Dear Horace,

My birth name was Sandra Peel. My family was from Bedford, IN. I was adopted as a baby and didn't know my birth family until 1990. I've done a lot of research and have information on most of my family except for John F. Peel.

My great-great grandmother Sarah Elizabeth Funk married a John F. Peel in Orange Co, IN.

Sarah was born in 1856 and she was 22 at marriage. They had a son, Charles Fletcher Peel. Then John disappeared and a divorce was obtained, so I know nothing about him. I may also be assuming that John 's middle name is Fletcher since their son was named Charles Fletcher Fletcher. Peel. With the Fletcher name being borne by both men, I suspect that John was a son of or related to Fletcher Peel. If this is ever proved to be true, I can say "Hello Cousin".

When I was searching for my birth family, I sent letters to so many Peels and Peeles. All over the country. I was born in Detroit, but knew my mother was from another state. I got one reply from a man in Texas, who asked his father about it. He replied the only other Peel he met stopped by one day and the last he saw him he was crossing the creek and heading west. When I found my birth family, all I had was a half-aunt (who wasn't a Peel) and two great aunts who couldn't remember anything about the family. My mother died at 54, her parents were 30 and 36 at their passing.

Sarah married again after the divorce and had several more children. Her son Charles married and had 6 kids and his wife died. Sarah raised his children even though he remarried and had 5 more kids by his next wife. The oldest of son James Henry Peel, my grandfather, married and had one daughter and then the wife died. Sarah raised the daughter until she was 13 and then Sarah died. Grandfather remarried and had my mother and a son, then died at 30 of Pneumonia. Grandmother married again and had my half-aunt who is just 5 years older than me. She died from blood poisoning after having a miscarriage due to a car accident. My mother died at 54 of a stroke. It's weird to think I've outlived two generations of family and I'm only 68.

Is my John F possibly the son of Fletcher Peelle who is the son of David Peelle or the son of David Peelle's brother Willis Peelle? David and Willis married sisters, Priscilla and Elizabeth "Betsy", so it could be logical to have more Fletcher names in this line. They both had sons named John in NC, maybe that's where John came from and logically would come through Kentucky. It's funny how some families can be traced back hundreds of years and others are so obscure.
